Something to Say at the Tish

In this week's Parshah we learn about the Arei Miklat-cities of refuge. One who kills accidently must leave his home and live in one of these cities, both to atone for the loss of life that came about through his actions, and to be safe from victims close relatives who have the right to kill him if he is found outside of one of these cities. He is required to live there until the death of the Kohen Gadol and then he is free to go home.

The Gemara in Makos explains that the freedom of the murderer is linked to the death of the Kohen Gadol because the Kohen Gadol is also partially responsible for the murder. If he would have davened properly, through his prayers, he could have prevented this unfortunate death from taking place. As a result of not praying properly the life of the Kohen Gadol was now dependent on the prayers of murderers. The murderers forced to live in these cities of refuge, are anxious to get home and will pray for the death of the Kohen Gadol to take place sooner rather than later. In fact, the Gemara continues, the mother of the Kohen Gadol would provide food and clothing for the inhabitants of the Arei Miklat to encourage them to daven for her son that he should live long instead of praying for his death.

We see here the power of Tefilah and how seriously we must approach our davening. With his davening the Kohen Gadol could have prevented this loss of life and alternately the prayers of the murderer could hasten the death of the Kohen Gadol. Perhaps if we view our davening with the proper respect and realize how much we can accomplish through our prayers, much senseless killing, can be prevented.

Parsha Questions: Parshas Matos-Masei

Who may annul a vow?

30:2 - Preferably, an expert in the laws of *nedarim*. Otherwise, three ordinary people.

When may a father annul his widowed daughter's vows? 30:10 - If she is under 12 and 1/2 years old and widowed before she was fully married.

Why were the Jewish People not commanded to attack Moav, as they were to attack Midian?

31:2 - Because Moav only acted out of fear against the Jewish People. Also, Rus was destined to come from Moav.

Those selected to fight Midian went unwillingly. Why? 31:5 - They knew that Moshe's death would follow. What holy vessels accompanied the Jewish People into battle? 31:6 - The *aron* and the *tzitz*.

Besides removing traces of forbidden food, what else is needed to make metal vessels obtained from a non-Jew fit for a Jewish owner?

31:23 - Immersion in a mikveh.

During the conquest of the Land, where did *Bnei Gad* and *Bnei Reuven* position themselves? 32:17 - At the head of the troops.

What promise did *Bnei Gad* and *Bnei Reuven* make beyond that which Moshe required?

32:24 - Moshe required them to remain west of the Jordan during the conquest of the Land. They promised to remain

after the conquest until the Land was divided among the tribes.

Why does the Torah list the places where the Jewish People camped?

33:1 - To show Hashem's love of the Jewish People. Although it was decreed that they wander in the desert, they did not travel continuously. During 38 years, they moved only 20 times.

Why did the King of Arad feel at liberty to attack the Jewish People?

33:40 - When Aharon died, the clouds of glory protecting the Jewish People departed.

What length was the camp in the *midbar*? 33:49 - Twelve *mil*.

Why does the Torah need to specify the boundaries that are to be inherited by the Jewish People?

34:2 - Because certain *mitzvos* apply only in the Land.

When did the three cities east of the Jordan begin to function as refuge cities?

35:13 - After Yehoshua separated three cities west of the Jordan.

There were six refuge cities, three on each side of the Jordan. Yet, on the east side of the Jordan there were only two and a half tribes. Why did they need three cities?

35:14 - Because murders were more common there.
